From the Pastor

The psychiatrist Viktor Frankl was imprisoned in a Nazi concentration camp for many months during World War II. He lost many family members, including his wife, and suffered greatly physically. But in the camp, he became intrigued by how people cope in extreme conditions. He came to the conclusion that many things can be taken away from a person— possessions, family, friends, dignity, basic needs. Indeed, almost everything can be taken from a person. But the one thing that can never be taken away is the person's choice in how to react to the circumstances. The person can always control his or her reaction to circumstances, no matter how abysmal they may be. When people do this, they show forth the works of God.

The gospel today tells of two terrible kind of blindness. One is suffered by the man at the heart of the story. He was born unable to see – never looking into the smiling face of his father or mother, or the flash of lightening in a dark cloud, or a beautiful flower. But, how blind were the religious leaders, who could not see what a transforming gift Jesus had given to Bartimaeus. They were searching for any reason to be able to condemn Jesus. And making a bit of mud to anoint his eyelids was considered to be “work” and so Jesus broke the Sabbath prohibition on doing any physical activity – they could not see beyond this tiny infraction of their application of

the Law to the wonderful blessing that Jesus had bestowed on this pitiable man and his parents.

We too have to be careful not to permit that kind of blindness to afflict our way of looking at the world. We can be so blind – the green-eyed envy that makes us upset because someone else is recognized for the good they do when we think we should get the credit. We can sit in the dark and feel sorry for our self because someone else has nicer parents, more talented children, more friends, and then we overlook what a blessing each person is to us, because many in our world are alone and neglected.

Jesus was the one in control of giving the blessing of sight to this man – all his life he had wanted to be able to see, and it did not happen until his path crossed that of Jesus. But the blind man chose to be a vocal witness to how Jesus had blessed his life.

During this fourth week of Lent, perhaps that should be our commitment – to take control of how we react to all the blessings we see being given in our own life, and in the lives of those around us. Every blessing, large or small is a sign of how much we are loved by God. And we can close our eyes, choose to be blind to how greatly we are blessed. Or we can choose to live with spirit of gratitude. God is blessing us every day – all we need to do is open our eyes, and we will see that this is true.

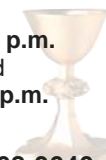

El psiquiatra Viktor Frankl fue encarcelado en un campo de concentración Nazi por muchos meses durante la Segunda Guerra Mundial. Él perdió a muchos miembros de su familia, incluyendo a su esposa, y sufrió mucho físicamente. Pero en el campo, se sintió intrigado por cómo la gente hace frente condiciones extremas. Llegó a la conclusión de que muchas cosas pueden ser quitados de una persona— posesiones, familia, amigos, la dignidad, las necesidades básicas. De hecho, casi todo puede ser extraído de una persona. Pero la única cosa que nunca pueden quitar es la elección de la persona en la como reacciona ante las circunstancias. La persona siempre puede controlar su reacción a las circunstancias, no importa como abismales sean. Cuando la gente hace esto, manifiestan las obras de Dios.

El Evangelio de hoy nos habla de dos terrible tipos de ceguera. Uno de ellos es sufrido por el hombre en el corazón de la historia. Nació incapaz de ver—sin mirar a la cara sonriente de su padre o madre, o el destello de un rayo en una nube oscura, o una hermosa flor. Pero, ¿cómo de ciegos fueron los líderes religiosos, que no podían ver el regalo transformador que Jesús le había dado a Bartimeo. Ellos estaban buscando alguna razón para condenar a Jesús. Y haciendo un poco de lodo para ungir a los párpados se consideraba "trabajo" entonces Jesús rompió la prohibición del Sabbath de realizar cualquier actividad física—no podían ver más al fondo de esta pequeña infracción de su aplicación de la Ley hacia la bendición maravillosa que Jesús había concedido a este hombre lamentable y sus padres.

Nosotros también tenemos que tener cuidado de no permitir ese tipo de

ceguera que afecta a nuestra manera de ver el mundo. Podemos ser tan ciegos- la envidia de ojos verdes que nos molesta porque alguien más es reconocido por el bien que ellos hacen cuando pensamos nosotros debemos recibir el crédito. Podemos sentarnos en la oscuridad y sentir lastima por nosotros mismos porque alguien más tiene padres más agradable, hijos más talentosos, más amigos, y luego no tomamos en cuenta la bendición de cada persona es para nosotros, porque muchos en nuestro mundo están solos y abandonados.



Lo único que necesitamos hacer es abrir los ojos



Jesús era el que tenía el control de dar la bendición de la vista a este hombre—toda su vida había querido poder ver, y no pudo ser hasta que su camino se cruzó con la de Jesús. Pero el ciego decidido a ser testigo vocal de como Jesús bendijo su vida.

Durante esta cuarta semana de Cuaresma, tal vez eso debería ser nuestro compromiso—tomar control de la manera en que reaccionamos a todas las bendiciones que vemos en nuestras propias vidas, y en las vidas de quienes nos rodean. Toda bendición, grande o pequeña es un signo de lo mucho que nos ama Dios. Y podemos cerrar nuestros ojos, elegir ser ciegos a lo mucho que hemos sido bendecidos. O podemos optar por vivir con espíritu de gratitud. Dios nos bendice cada día—lo único que necesitamos hacer es abrir los ojos, y veremos que esto es verdad.
